BELFAST

The capital of Northern Ireland — part of the United Kingdom — Belfast has experienced a renaissance since the 1994 cease-fire that promised an end to the decades-old “Troubles” between Catholics and Protestants. Stretching along both sides of the River Lagan, this graceful city of Victorian and Edwardian buildings has become a cosmopolitan tourist destination. Once a major industrial center, Belfast is also your gateway to the rich, Irish countryside of Ulster, Antrim and Donegal.

THINGS TO SEE AND DO IN AND AROUND BELFAST

Botanic Gardens — Founded in 1828, the popular gardens are home to music concerts and the historic Palm House, one of the first cast-iron greenhouses in the world.

Giant's Causeway — Myth claims the giant Finn McCool used the causeway as stepping stones to travel from Ireland to Scotland to visit his lover, a Scots giantess. Scientists believe the causeway's basalt columns resulted from cooling lava flows.

Lisburn — The center of the Irish linen trade, Lisburn also lies at the heart of Northern Ireland's flourishing crafts community.

Londonderry — Londonderry is the only completely walled city remaining in the British Isles. The highlights include the Guildhall, a late Gothic-style building with stained glass windows illustrating the city's history.

CORK (Cobh)

Founded in the 6th century by St. Finbarr, Cork is your gateway to romantic Ireland. Stroll down narrow country lanes and see the Lakes of Killarney. The intrepid visitor may scale the narrow passages of Blarney Castle to kiss the Blarney Stone. The region around Cork is also home to the densest concentration of prehistoric monuments in Western Europe. And, in a land where fable and fact blend to become folklore, it was near Cork that the great Tuatha De Danaan, a race with magical powers, was driven underground by the conquering Celts.

THINGS TO SEE AND DO IN AND AROUND CORK

Corcaigh – In Irish this means “marshy place,” which Cork was until St. Finbarr arrived and founded a monastery here during the 6th century. Today, Cork has a population of 135,000, making it the second-largest city in the Republic.

Blarney Castle – This romantic ruin is the site of the Blarney Stone. Those kissing the stone are endowed with the gift of eloquence.

Kinsale – The picturesque old fishing port boasts a wealth of well-preserved 18th-century buildings.


Waterford Crystal Factory – Ireland’s famed Waterford Crystal dates from 1783. A visit to the factory includes a guided tour that takes in all stages of crystal production — and includes a stop in the beautiful showroom.

Charles Fort – One of the finest examples of a 17th-century fortification, this fort was primarily constructed as a coastal defense to prevent attacking naval forces from entering Kinsale Harbor.

DUBLIN

Dublin has experienced a renaissance. Today, this gracious and cosmopolitan city on the Liffey is one of Europe's premier destinations. The capital of the Republic of Ireland, Dublin is an intimate place that is easy to explore. Stroll past St. Stephen's Green or survey the gray, stone façades of Trinity College, Ireland's oldest university. The city is also remarkably well-preserved — every June 16, scholars retrace the paths of James Joyce's characters in the novel *Ulysses*, set in Dublin on June 16, 1904.

THINGS TO SEE AND DO IN AND AROUND DUBLIN

St. Patrick's Cathedral – Founded in 1190, the cathedral stands on the spot where St. Patrick supposedly made his first Irish converts to Christianity in the 5th century.

Trinity College – Ireland's oldest university boasts a roster of distinguished alumni and is home to the Book of Kells.

Malahide Castle – Begun during the 12th century, the castle features 268 acres of grounds and boasts a superb collection of Irish period furniture and portraits.

Powerscourt House & Garden – This estate near the Wicklow Hills is home to one of the finest gardens in Ireland.

Glendalough Ruins – The monastic ruins in the Wicklow Hills include a 10th-century tower and the remains of a cathedral.

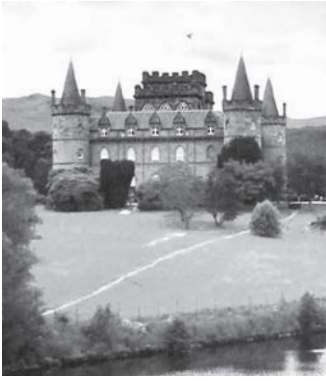

LE HAVRE (PARIS/NORMANDY)

Perhaps no other place in France holds more associations for English-speaking visitors than Normandy. The historic Allied landings on D-Day — June 6, 1944 — live on in the memories of British and Americans alike. Nor has Le Havre forgotten the dark days of the war. The port was nearly completely destroyed during the Normandy campaign. Today, Le Havre is France's second-largest port and the gateway to Paris, "City of Light," the Norman countryside, and the historic landing beaches.

Paris – The City of Light is filled with unforgettable sights, from the Eiffel Tower to Notre Dame Cathedral and the Louvre.

Louvre – The former royal palace is one of the world's great museums with an unbelievable collection of masterworks from Da Vinci to Picasso.

Versailles – Louis XIV turned his father's hunting lodge into the most luxurious palace complexes ever built. The great Le Notre designed the formal gardens and fountains.

Rouen – The capital of the Haute Normandie, Rouen was one of the greatest cities in medieval France and boasts a superb gothic cathedral. The English burned Joan of Arc in the cathedral square in 1437.

The Landing Sites – The D-Day invasion beaches — Sword, Juno, Gold, Omaha and Utah — stretch west along the Norman coast from Caen toward Cherbourg.

American Cemetery at Colleville-St. Laurent – The beautiful cemetery is the final resting place for 10,000 U.S. soldiers.

Place de la Concorde – Flowers and chestnut trees surround this beautiful square — the scene of execution for thousands who perished during the terror of the French Revolution. Marie Antoinette and more than 1,000 other Frenchmen met their fate at the guillotine.

LIVERPOOL

This great industrial port grew to prominence as a result of trade with the Americas. That tradition continued in the '60s as the Beatles mounted the first wave of rock 'n' roll's "British Invasion". Actually, the city possesses cultural charms beyond the Beatles. Liverpool is home to two of the finest neoclassical buildings in Europe. At nearby Port Sunlight, magnate William Lever built a model industrial village and created the Lady Lever Gallery. The museum is home to a superb collection of English paintings and furniture.

THINGS TO SEE AND DO IN AND AROUND LIVERPOOL

The Beatles Story – This multimedia exhibit chronicles the "Fab Four" from their days in Hamburg to their final break-up.

Mathew Street – The Beatles appeared nearly 300 times at the Cavern Club between 1961 and 1963.

Penny Lane – Photograph the street sign immortalized by The Beatles.

Albert Dock – Once Liverpool's trading center to North America, Albert Dock and its brick warehouses have been restored to create Liverpool's premier heritage attraction.

Port Sunlight – William Hesketh Lever built this model village to provide housing for the workers in his soap factory. Port Sunlight's standard of housing was remarkable for its time.

The Lady Lever Gallery – The gallery's 30 rooms provide a superb repository of English painting including works by Reynolds, Gainsborough, Turner, Constable, and the pre-Raphaelite school.

Chester – The city began life in the first century A.D. as Deva, a Roman *castra stativa* or permanent garrison. Portions of the original Roman walls are still visible.

Chester Cathedral – The 13th-century Norman cathedral was originally an abbey church. Chester was raised to cathedral status following Henry VIII's dissolution of the monasteries in 1550.

Conwy Castle – Edward I began construction of Conwy Castle in 1283 as part of his campaign to secure Wales for the English crown.

Snowdonia National Park – Created in 1953, Snowdonia National Park encompasses 838 square miles. Considered the crowning glory of Wales, Snowdonia boasts wild, rocky mountains.

REYKJAVIK

The patron saints of Reykjavik are fire and ice. Iceland is a land of volcanoes and glaciers, lava fields and green pastures, boiling thermal springs and ice-cold rivers teeming with salmon. This unspoiled demi-paradise is also home to a very old and sophisticated culture. The northernmost capital in the world, Reykjavik was founded in 874 when Ingolfur Arnarson threw wood pillars into the sea, vowing to settle where the pillars washed ashore. Today, Iceland is an international center of commerce and home to one of the most technologically sophisticated societies in the world.

THINGS TO SEE AND DO IN AND AROUND REYKJAVIK

Gullfoss – Iceland's most famous waterfall plunges down a series of cascades into a gorge.

Strokkur Geyser – Like Old Faithful, Iceland's famous geyser erupts at regular intervals.

Thingvellir National Park – This rift valley was also the historic meeting place of the Althing, one of the oldest political assemblies on Earth.

Blue Lagoon – After generating power, mineral-rich water is pumped into this man-made lagoon from a nearby geothermal plant.



The Pearl – Reykjavik's giant steel-and-glass dome features an observation deck with 360-degree views of the city.

Kerid – A volcanic phenomenon known as an explosion crater, Kerid was blasted out by an eruption more than 3,000 years ago.

Cars or taxis are also used at some ports where coach or bus transportation is not available or limited. Where excursions are operated by car, four to eight passengers are allocated to each car. Passengers wishing to travel with friends should all leave the ship together, as this will help the Tour Staff to allocate them space in the same vehicle. For the comfort of all passengers, smoking is prohibited aboard the sightseeing vehicles.

WITHDRAWAL OF TOURS

The Tour Operator reserves the right to withdraw any excursion through lack of demand and to make any alterations that they may deem advisable for the comfort of the passengers, bearing in mind the convenience and best interest of each group.

ECOLOGY & ENVIRONMENT
