EMERGENCY SITUATIONS

Please review the Emergency Evacuation Procedures, Evacuation Route and the Assembly Area plan attached to your door.

If There is an Earthquake...

- Get away from the windows.
- Seek shelter under supported doorways or tables.
- Do not attempt to leave the building unless instructed to do so.
- If outdoors, stay in the open, away from buildings and power lines
- Be ready for aftershocks.

If a Fire Starts in Your Room...

- Sound the alarm IMMEDIATELY by activating the nearest fire alarm.
- Proceed directly to your Assembly Area. Remain there and await further instructions.

If a Fire Starts in Another Part of the Lodge...

- You will be alerted by a strobe light, an alarm, a phone call or the sound of fire engines.
- DO NOT STAND! Smoke and dangerous gases rise. Crawl to your door, covering your face, if possible.
- Feel the door with the back of your hand. If the door or knob is hot, don't open it and call the operator for instructions.
- If safe to do so, proceed directly to your Assembly Area via the closest, safest stairway.
- Any elevators will be recalled to the 1st floor in a fire emergency.

WILDLIFE SAFETY

Bear Encounters

Bear/human encounters are rare and almost always have peaceful resolutions. The National and State Park Service advise the following behavior in order to avoid a negative encounter:

- Walk in groups and make noise. Avoid surprising a bear.
- Never approach a bear. If you see a bear, slowly backtrack from where you came. Never run from a bear nor turn your back towards it.
- Do not attract bears with food. Dispose of unwanted food in indoor trash receptacles, or bear proof trash containers.

Moose Encounters

- Moose can move quickly. In defense, a moose may kick forward with its powerful front legs or backwards with its hind legs.
- Never feed moose.
- Give moose space. If the moose approaches you, give at least 50-foot distance.
- Charging moose: if its ears lay back or the hairs on its hump rise, it may charge. If a moose charges, get behind a tree.
- Never get between a cow and her calf.
